Ben Gvir called Italy a "flip-flop." Meloni told him to shove it. When the Italian right is publicly feuding with Israel's far-right ministers, something is shifting.

Where Else Is This Happening?

The Albania and Italy situations aren't isolated. The pattern is spreading across multiple countries, though the triggers vary:

- **Turkey** — Erdogan has been escalating anti-Israel rhetoric for years, but now there's genuine grassroots pressure, not just top-down posturing. The JTA article even fingers Turkey as a funding source for anti-Israel messaging in Albania (which, whether true or exaggerated, points to a broader regional realignment).
 - **Spain, Ireland, Belgium** — These countries have been the most vocal in the EU about Palestinian statehood and sanctions. University occupations and dockworker actions have been ongoing since 2024. Spain formally recognized Palestine, and the pushback hasn't been just symbolic — ports in Barcelona and Valencia have seen repeated disruptions.
